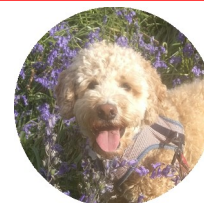

### Year 4—Maple

Maple class have had a busy few weeks. They are four weeks into their swimming lessons at St. Nicholas Park. Even in such a short period of time, the children are showing great progress with their swimming strokes. For those children that can't yet swim they have developed a lot of confidence being in the water.

The playground, classroom and corridors have been full of singing recently. The children absolutely loved the Year 4, 5 and 6 performance and put their all into the singing particularly. Even now that the play has finished, we can still hear the songs echoing around the school! During the performance, it gave a great opportunity to learn a little more about what it was like to be a Victorian child and some historical facts linked with Vikings.

On Tuesday we had our final visit to the Heart of England Forest where we have been learning Maths skills throughout the year. This time the children consolidated their class work on triangles by making as many different scalene triangles as they could using sticks. They then used positional language to guide a team through the forest to collect their forest animal. Finally they were taught how to use a compass and successfully managed to navigate through the forest to the "fat oak" where they had a treat of hot chocolate waiting for them.

Well done, Year 4 on an active and exciting few weeks.





## Parents and carers invited to join SEND webinar on speech and language provision

Warwickshire County Council is hosting another special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) webinar on Tuesday 19 July on the topic of Speech and Language Provision.

There can be many reasons why a young person may have a Speech, Language and Communication Need (SLCN). It may be due to physical difficulties such as a cleft palate or a hearing impairment, or it could be linked to other developmental conditions such as Autism. In some cases, there is no obvious cause.

Whatever the reason for a SLCN, it's important that children and young people receive timely support to improve their overall development and educational outcomes. This webinar will provide parents and carers with a better understanding of the different levels of speech and language therapy support and how to access this for their child. It will also be an opportunity to share feedback on the current provision to help inform and improve future support across Warwickshire.
