Year 1 have been using practical resources to compare numbers, finding which numbers could fit between two others on a number line. In Year 3 the children have been developing their understanding of greater than and less than, using the relevant symbols accurately.

It was also great to see that Year 2 had been using our outdoor environ ment and taking part in some exciting maths trails. The children in Year 5
were playing an enjoyable game using digit cards to make numbers that
they could round to the nearest 10 and 100.

<u>**Talk**</u> to your child. Their online lives and countless games and apps they use can appear overwhelming. It is important that you understand their online lives so the support you can give them isn't limited.

Use <u>parental controls</u>. All games, apps and consoles comes with parental controls such as turning off chat. Children and young people use gaming to socialise with each other so if you do allow them to use the chat functions, keep a watchful eye on their friends list and question if you don't recognise someone.
