Heathcote Science Days 2021

There was a real buzz around school on Monday and Tuesday last week as children took part in our Science Days. This year's focus was on bees, understanding the important job these insects do for our environment and the sad fact that they are becoming endangered. Britain has lost an estimated 97% of it's wildflower meadows since WW2 and this has had a serious impact on pollinators needed for plant reproduction. The days helped raise awareness amongst the children and helped them understand things that we can do to help our bee populations. Lots of brilliant work that has taken place across the school includes:

Investigating and understanding the process of pollination.

Knowing which plants bees pollinate and the foods we get from them.

Reading fascinating facts. For example- Did you know that there are around 250 different species of bee?

Researching the different plants and habitats that bees like.

Identifying, drawing and labelling the different parts of a bees anatomy.

Designing incredible gardens that are bee-friendly for the BBC's 'Big Bee Challenge'.
