Spotlight on a SEND

Special Education Needs covers four main areas of need:

- Cognition and Learning;
- Communication and Interaction;
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health;
- Physical and Sensory.

Our staff are trained in meeting the needs of our pupils with additional needs and we also utilise the expertise of Educational Psychologists, SEND Supported, Speech and Language Therapy and counselling to inform and provide recommendations to support individual children. Our Heathcote Team of teachers and teaching assistants generate programmes of intervention and support to enable children's specific areas of need to be targeted and these are reviewed to ensure there is impact. With staff members each having a variety of skills and training, we are constantly learning from each other as well as learning from the children, who regularly set us new challenges to meet!



Safeguarding corner—Being on time for school (part1)

Why should I arrive for school on time?

It is important that children arrive in school on time everyday for a number of reasons:

- it is the legal responsibility of parents/carers to ensure that children attend school on time
- If a child is later they miss important information about the days activity
- A child that is late will miss school work
- Children that arrive in good time for registration are able to talk to their friends before school and settle into the school day.
- A child who is arriving late may feel sad, embarrassed or unsettled.
- A child that is late disrupts staff and other children.

Getting your child to school on time really matters.		
If in a school year your child is late everyday	Your child would have lost approximately	Or they would have missed approximately
5 Minutes	3 days from school	16 Lessons
10 Minutes	5 days from school	32 Lessons
15 Minutes	8 days from school	48 Lessons
20 Minutes	11 days from school	63 Lessons
30 Minutes	16 days from school	95 Lessons

Lateness = lost learning!
