Reading - Key texts: Over The Line by Tom

Developing pleasure and motivation to read.

Word reading and comprehension skills through a variety of text types during VIPERS reading sessions and written activities. (Weekly skills building) In Flanders Fields, For the Fallen, Walter Tull Sources. Christmas Truce, Life in the Trenches and Marthe McKenna.

Reading skill focus – Vocabulary and inference. Choosing own texts and sustained reading for pleasure.

Dictionary use to check meaning.

<u>Speaking and Listening:</u> Poetry recitals, discussion and presentation during topic work, hot seating characters. Children will debate points of view.

<u>Writing Composition</u> - Writing for different purposes, developing stamina, editing and checking work throughout.

Narrative: Using historical knowledge to write letters home from the front line. Writing the next section from our story in the style of the writer.

Nonfiction: Writing instruction texts for a recipe of a good friend. A biography of Walter Tull.

Poetry: A selection of war poetry and children to respond with their own.

Spelling: Weekly spelling lessons based on the patterns within the Year 5 and 6 Statutory Word Lists

Grammar: Coordinating conjunctions, subordinating conjunctions, tense consistency, modal verbs, parenthesis and relative clauses. Handwriting: Weekly practise based on spelling patterns. Emphasis on neat presentation and pride in all written work.

Complete, read and interpret information in tables, including timetables. Solve comparison, sum and difference problems using information presented in a line graph.

Number: Multiplication and Division

Identify multiples, factors and establish whether a number up to 100 is prime and recall prime numbers up to 19. Multiply and divide whole numbers by 10, 100 and 1000.

Measurement: Perimeter and Area

Calculate and compare the area of rectangles using standard units, square centimetres (cm2) and square metres (m2) and estimate the area of irregular shapes.

Computing - E-Safety

To spot Spam emails and know what to do with them. Write citations of websites I have used in research. Help protect my information by knowing how to create strong passwords. Understand how photos can be altered and falsely presented online. Apply online safety rules to real life scenarios. Use technology safely, respectfully and responsibly. Know how to report my concerns.

Science

Properties and Changes of Materials

Compare materials based on their properties. Know that some materials dissolve in liquid to form a solution and know how to recover the substance. Use knowledge of solids, liquids and gasses to decide how mixtures could be separated. demonstrate that dissolving, mixing and changes of state are reversible changes. Explain that some changes result in the formation of new materials and are usually irreversible.
